


CATHOLIC BISHOPS' CONFERENCE OF INDIA (CBCI)

XXXVI Biennial General Body Meeting Final Statement

Jan. 31-Feb. 07, 2024, St. John's National Academy of Health Sciences, Bengaluru, India

INTRODUCTION

1/With joyful confidence in the Lord Jesus Christ, we, the 170 Bishops of the Catholic Bishops' Conference of India (CBCI), gathered at St. John's National Academy of Health Sciences, Bengaluru, from January 31 to February 07, 2024, for our XXXVI General Assembly to reflect on the theme: The Church's Response to the Current Socio-Political Situation of the Country and the Benefits and Challenges of Artificial Intelligence (AI). Our reflection was done against the backdrop of the ongoing 'Synod on Synodality' (October 2021-October 2024) with the theme Communion-Mission-Participation which encapsulates the essential nature of the Church. Synodality calls us to listen to the Spirit and to each other, "For in the one Spirit we were all baptized into one body" (1 Cor 12:13). We were inspired by the call of Pope Francis: "Let us dream, then, as a single human family, as fellow travellers sharing the same flesh, as children of the same earth which is our common home, each of us bringing the richness of his or her beliefs and convictions, each of us with his or her own voice, brothers and sisters all" (Fratelli Tutti 8).

I. THE CURRENT SOCIO-POLITICAL SITUATION AND OUR RESPONSE

- **2/** Ours is an ancient civilization with a rich cultural heritage of unity in diversity. Indians cherish the values of religious harmony, non-violence and peace which are enshrined in the Constitution. During the CBCI Meeting, responding to the signs of the time, we first reviewed the situation currently prevailing in our country. India has made tremendous advances in the scientific, technological, economic and other fields the country has been acknowledged as an emerging economic power in the world. The Christian Community feels proud of our country's progress. However, we do find grave reasons for concern:
- **2.1.** Economic development in our country seems to have benefitted only a small percentage. The rate of unemployment has vastly increased. Largescale migration has caused untold misery to many. So also, scientific and technological development has not yet reached the majority of our people especially in the rural areas, resulting in a digital divide.
- **2.2.** We feel that development is often done to the detriment of ecology, disrupting the life especially of our tribal brothers and sisters, many of whom are being dispossessed of their lands. We have also witnessed in anguish the sufferings of the fisherfolk in the coastal areas and the long-drawn out struggle of the farmers.
- **2.3.** There is an apprehension that divisive attitudes, hate speeches and fundamentalist movements are eroding the pluralistic, secular ethos which has always characterized our country and its Constitution. The Fundamental Rights and Minority Rights guaranteed in the Constitution should never be undermined.
- **2.4.** Attacks on Christians continue to increase in different parts of India. Destruction of homes and churches, harassment of personnel serving in orphanages, hostels, educational and healthcare institutions on false allegations of conversion have become common. We are appalled by prolonged violence in Manipur resulting in the huge loss of life and livelihood.

- **2.5.** There is a widespread perception that the important democratic institutions of our country are weakening, the federal structure is under stress and the media are not fulfilling their role as the fourth pillar of democracy.
- **2.6.** There is an unprecedented religious polarization which is harming the cherished social harmony in our country and endangering democracy itself.
- **3/** Our Response to the present situation is along the path of non-violence, healing, justice and reconciliation. With this in view, we propose the following:
- **3.1.** As Christians, our first response is PRAYER, "for with God all things are possible" (Matthew:19:26). The CBCI asks that each Diocese observes Friday, 22 March 2024 as a Day of Prayer and Fasting for peace and harmony in our country.
- **3.2.** We renew the Church's commitment to serve the weaker sections of society irrespective of caste, creed and gender so as to ensure that the benefits of development reach the least and the last.
- **3.3.** We want to ensure that our families, communities and institutions imbibe and promote the values of the Constitution.
- **3.4.** We appeal to our political leaders to make all attempts to preserve the basic structure of the Constitution, particularly the Preamble which declares India to be a SOVEREIGN SOCIALIST SECULAR DEMOCRATIC REPUBLIC committed to Justice, Liberty, Equality and Fraternity.
- **3.5.** We urge all citizens to enroll as voters and exercise their sacred duty to vote wisely so that we elect leaders who are committed to constitutional values and to the uplift of the poor.
- **3.6.** We reiterate our demand that the Government grant Scheduled Caste status to Dalit Christians and other discriminated minorities. Similarly, the Government should desist from any attempt to deprive Christian Tribals of their Scheduled Tribe status and also from delisting of the tribal population of our country.
- **3.7.** While we demand for the protection of our Fundamental and Minority Rights guaranteed by the Constitution, we will continue to be law abiding and responsible citizens of our beloved Motherland.
- **3.8.** We request our Parish and Diocesan Commissions for Ecology to sensitize people about the ecological dangers in our present lifestyle such as overusing non-renewable resources of the earth, pollution of water and air, and wastage of food. We want to inculcate in all an attitude of caring for our 'common home'.
- **3.9.** We will journey together with all people of goodwill, sharing in each other's joys and sorrows. We will conscientize the members of the Church to build bridges with their brothers and sisters of different faiths through Inter-Religious Dialogue and neighbourhood communities.

II. CHURCH'S RESPONSE TO THE BENEFITS AND CHALLENGES OF ARTIFICIAL INTELLIGENCE

4/ In the context of our mission, at the General Assembly, we deliberated on the benefits and challenges of Artificial Intelligence (AI) recognizing digital technologies, including Artificial Intelligence, as gifts of God. Pope Francis urges us: "Let us boldly become citizens of the digital world" (World Communications Day Message, 2024).

- **5/** AI holds out the promise of tremendous benefits in the fields of health care, agriculture, education and research, engineering, recreation, business and finance. However, AI systems can be misused: In the wrong hands, the very same technologies can become tools that spread hatred, violence, manipulation and social bigotry. There is the danger that the human data collected by Digital platforms and AI can be misused to undermine the privacy of individuals and families. Hence, the CBCI urges the Government to engage with all stakeholders to regulate the development and use of AI so as to encourage the best practices and prevent abuses.
- **6/** Human beings, in all their social and cultural diversity, cannot be reduced to 'mere data' or be defined by algorithms. Hence, we recommend that:
- **6.1.** The Communication Office in each Diocese organize well-planned media programmes whereby the entire community children, youth, families, religious and clergy can be educated in the responsible use of digital and AI tools, safeguarding against manipulation and abuse. We want to promote ethical use of AI to be responsible citizens of the digital world.
- **6.2.** Our Diocesan and Regional Commissions for Social Communications and Youth Associations harness the available AI tools for effective faith formation and creative sharing of the Good News. We appeal to our young people who are skilled in AI to help in this endeavour.
- **6.3.** Dioceses, Religious Congregations and Lay Associations equip our youth to benefit from the opportunities offered by the AI revolution.
- **7/** The Catholic Church in India firmly reiterates that the path to integral human development lies in promoting justice, equality, truth and freedom as a communitarian effort for the common good. For this, AI can serve as a useful instrument, provided that the human person in all his or her complexity, dignity and sanctity is respected and protected.

CONCLUSION:

8/ As Pilgrims of Hope, in the spirit of Synodality, the Church in India moves ahead towards the Jubilee Year 2025. Over the years, Christians have served the country with dedication, whether it be in the Armed Forces, in education and literacy, in health and social services. Our service to the country has been acknowledged by many of our fellow citizens. As loyal citizens of India, we will continue serving our country whatever be the cost, walking in the footsteps of Jesus our Master who proclaimed: "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me because he has anointed me to proclaim good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim liberty to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to set at liberty those who are oppressed, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favour" (Luke 4:18-19). We pray for the welfare and prosperity of our country as we entrust our country to the Blessed Virgin Mary, our Mother, the Star of Hope.

EMBRACING JUSTICE IN TODAY'S WORLD: A REFLECTION ON CATHOLIC SOCIAL TEACHING

Introduction:

Since ancient times, the guiding principle for the social work profession has been the Christian Gospel's message that "service to man is service to God." Grounded in the belief that every human being is created in the image of God and redeemed by Iesus Christ. Catholic social teaching asserts the inherent value and worth of each individual as a member of the human family. Following in the footsteps of Jesus Christ, the call to social ministry echoes through time, urging us to embody His teachings of compassion and justice in the contemporary landscape. As we grapple with the complexities of the modern world, the enduring principles of Catholic Social Teaching (CST) provide invaluable guidance for addressing contemporary challenges with compassion and justice. The following are several of the key themes that are at the heart of our Catholic social tradition.

- 1. Life and Dignity of the Human Person: In the spirit of respecting the sanctity of human life, we recall the words of Jesus from Matthew 22:39, "Love your neighbor as yourself." Pope Francis echoes this sentiment, emphasizing that "Each human being is an end in himself or herself, and never a means to be exploited for other purposes." We believe that every person is precious, that people are more important than things, and that the measure of every institution is whether it threatens or enhances the life and dignity of the human person.
- 2. Call to Family, Community, and Participation: The person is not only sacred but also social. How we organize our society in economics and politics, in law and policy directly affects human dignity and the capacity of individuals to grow in community. Marriage and the family are the central social institutions that must be supported and strengthened, not undermined. Pope John Paul II

eloquently emphasized that 'as the family goes, so goes the nation and so goes the whole world.' Our active participation in social, economic, and political life is vital, fostering a sense of responsibility for the common good. The Church believes that people have a right and a duty to participate in society, seeking together the common good and well-being of all, especially poor and vulnerable people.

- **3. Rights and Responsibilities:** In a society where rights are often advocated, CST echoes the importance of corresponding responsibilities. The Catholic tradition teaches that human dignity can be protected and a healthy community can be achieved only if human rights are protected and responsibilities are met. 'To those whom much is given, much is expected,' as the Gospel of Luke teaches. Therefore, every person has a fundamental right to life and a right to those things required for human decency. Corresponding to these rights are duties and responsibilities—to one another, to our families, and to the larger society.
- **4. Option for the Poor and Vulnerable:** Jesus's preferential option for the poor, a cornerstone of CST, speaks loudly in a world marked by inequality. A basic moral test is how our most vulnerable members are faring. Pope Benedict XVI urged us to 'open our eyes to the cries of those who suffer' (15th World day of the sick, 2007). In a society marred by deepening divisions between rich and poor, our tradition instructs us to put the needs of poor and vulnerable people first. Today, amidst economic disparities and global challenges, our commitment to the marginalized becomes a measure of our society's moral health. In Matthew 25:40, Jesus says, 'Truly I tell you, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me.'

5. The Dignity of Work and the Rights of Workers: In a rapidly changing work landscape, CST emphasizes the dignity of labor and the rights of workers. The economy must serve people, not the other way around. Pope Francis reminds us, 'Work is fundamental to the dignity of a person' (General Audience Address, May 1, 2013). Work is more than a way to make a living; it is a form of continuing participation in God's creation. This encourages us to advocate for fair wages, just working conditions, and the empowerment of all workers, with an emphasis on practicing these principles first within Church institutions. If the dignity of work is to be protected, then the basic rights of workers must be respected—the right to productive work, to decent and fair wages, to the organization and joining of unions, to private property, and to economic initiative.

6. Solidarity: Today we live in a world divided by conflict and injustice. Especially with wars happening in Ukraine and Gaza, the call to solidarity rings true. We are one human family, whatever our national, racial, ethnic, economic, and ideological differences. Pope John Paul II stated, 'Solidarity is not a feeling of vague compassion or shallow distress at the misfortunes of so many people. It is a firm and persevering determination to commit oneself to the common good.' Pope Francis has consistently urged us to recognize our interconnectedness, motivating us to work collectively for justice and peace, transcending borders and differences. At the core of the virtue of solidarity is the pursuit of justice and peace. Pope Paul VI taught that 'if you want peace, work for justice.' The Gospel calls us to be peacemakers. Our love for all our sisters and brothers demands that we promote peace in a world surrounded by violence and conflict.

1. Care for God's Creation: As environmental challenges loom large, CST's call to care for God's creation becomes urgent. Pope Francis's encyclical, Laudato Si', underscores our responsibility as stewards of the Earth. 'The earth is our common home, and all of us are brothers and sisters,' he asserts, urging sustainable practices for the wellbeing of present and future generations. We show our respect for the Creator by our stewardship of creation. Care for the earth is a requirement of the Catholic faith. We are called to protect people and the planet, living our faith in relationship with all of God's creation. This environmental challenge has fundamental moral and ethical dimensions that cannot be ignored.

Conclusion:

In the words of the Encyclical "Deus Caritas Est" (2005), "Seeing with the eyes of Christ, I can give to others much more than their outward necessities; I can give them the look of love which they crave." This profound insight encapsulates the essence of social ministry, highlighting the transformative power of compassion and the ability to meet not only external needs but also the deep longing for genuine care and understanding. In embracing this perspective, we can contribute to a society where the spirit of love fosters true human flourishing.

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GOOD SHEPHERD SISTERS - GARRATOLA

We have been rendering service at the Garratola mission for more than 42 years which has made a great impact on the people around here. We are involved in socio-pastoral developmental activities like Pastoral activity, EJ project, Women's Cooperative society, Residential for the school going girl children and Dispensary.

Pastoral Activity:

We visit the families and attend the BEC prayers regularly and encourage them to come to the Church. One Sister takes catechism classes for the children. We participate in women group meetings and support them to come forward in taking decisions in church activities. We collaborate with the parish team for various parish activities given to us.

Economic Justice Project:

Through this project, we serve 407 women directly and 360 men indirectly. We have 36 SHGs in 21 villages. The project was supported by Misean Cara and OAK foundation and monitored by MDO, Nagpur. Through this project various training programmes were organized like leadership/capacity training, Business and Marketing skills, Administration etc. During this year we celebrated National Girl Child Day, International





Activity of the Cooperative:

All the members of the cooperative run their small / big individual business such as Goat rearing, Piggery, poultry, brick making, Agriculture, vegetable cultivation, vegetable purchase and sale, petty shops, general store, garment shops etc. by taking and returning loan with 1% of interest rate. A General Body meeting was conducted for the election of New Board members. Quarterly review cum planning meetings of Board members and SHG Leaders were done regularly. Board members have to study the business plan of the members and pass the loan every month and also take action on the defaulters by sending a notice to the family/ visit the family. We organized an Exposure visits to other cooperative networks with the other NGOs and Gos and have joint programmes.

Euphrasia Girls Hostel:

The Children from interior villages come to the hostel and study in the Montfort school, 28 girls are in the hostel. Coaching classes are given to them during their study's hours, especially to those who are weak in studies. Individual and group counselling, value education and health & hygienic sessions were organized regularly. Some important celebrations like Diwali, Children's day, Christmas and Holi were celebrated meaningfully.



Dispensary:

At the request of the people, we have reopened a dispensary but a very few come due to RMP doctors going from house to house to treat them. The children from Montfort and our hostel come regularly and benefit from it. We too don't have any project for the dispensary to conduct a medical camp, so it has been rather unsuccessful.

GOOD SHEPHERD PROVINCIALATE, NAGPUR SOCIAL ACTION MINISTRY

Name of the Project: Socio-Economic empowerment of Domestic help around Nagpur.

INTRODUCTION:

Domestic workers play a crucial role in households worldwide, providing essential services such as cleaning, cooking, childcare, and elderly care. Despite their indispensable contributions, domestic workers often face numerous challenges, including low wages, lack of legal protection, and social stigma.

We, the sisters of the Good Shepherd, are working for the upliftment of Domestic help in collaboration with National Domestic Welfare Association, Mumbai from 2001 onwards.

At present we have 1500 women enrolled in this union and take active part for their development. We organize these women through different activities.

The following activities have carried out to empower these women:

Advocacy and Lobbying: In order to pressurise employers and policymakers to take actions for the different benefits of domestic help we organize rallies and demonstrations especially during the winter session of the parliament. This year in the month of December 275 women took a march to Yashwant Stadium where they demanded for their rights, like pension, holidays and other benefits. They submitted a memorandum to the Collector and Labour Minister.

Training programmes: Training programs for domestic workers are essential to equip them with the skills, knowledge, and resources they need to perform their jobs effectively and safely. Keeping this in mind we conduct three trainings in a month which includes different topics like: Advocacy and Lobbying, Awareness programme on their rights, Marketing skills, Constitutional rights and election manifesto, Domestic harassment, Stress management, different skill trainings and Housing rights etc...

Co-operative Society: Women groups are formed into a co-operative society and they save some amount every month. They are given inter loans for some small business, education of children, medical expenses etc...275 women are members of this co-operative society. We also have 10 SHGs which are functioning well, this encourages them to have a saving for their future.

Other Benefits: 100 senior domestic workers received ration twice a year. Women are given help to start group and individual business to improve their economic status.

Social Issues: We take up social issues like domestic harassment at home and work place. Many of our women are empowered and they are aware of their rights. They are courageous enough to meet MLA's and present their demands. Every year we celebrate the Domestic Workers Day on 16th June. Women are taken to Mumbai for this celebration.



Educational Support: 15 children were helped through our province for their school expenses like school fees, uniform and books.

Celebrations: We do celebrate different festivals and events. International Women's Day was celebrated on a big scale. 300 women took part in this celebration. During Christmas we also had the Christmas celebration for all our neighbours to share the joy of Christmas.

Conclusion:

The Domestic Workers Programme has made significant strides in promoting the rights and well-being of domestic workers. However, challenges remain in ensuring effective enforcement, combating stigma and discrimination, and addressing the needs of marginalized groups. Continued investment in advocacy, capacity building, and policy reform is essential to build on the program's achievements and create a more just and inclusive environment for domestic workers.

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

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SHARING CHRISTMAS JOY WITH MIRGRANT WORKERS

"Christmas is doing a Little something extra for someone". - Charles M. Schulz.

The Archdiocesan Commission for Migrants organized a Christmas programme for all the Catholic migrant workers residing in different parishes. The programme was held on 26th December 2023 in St. Martin De Porres Church, Jaripatka. We had about 230 participants including women, men and children. Migrant workers from Wadi, Nimji, Martin Nagar and a few students from Manipur took part in this celebration. We started the celebration with the Solemn Eucharist which was Solemnized by Most. Rev. Elias Gonsalves, Archbishop of Nagpur. Frs. Jesuraj Parish Priest of St. Martin De Porres Church, Fr. Rudolf Toppo, Parish Priest of Infant Jesus Church, Wadi, Fr. Anthony Xaviour, (Secretary of the Archbishop) and Deacon from St. Martin De Porres Church were the concelebrants. Archbishop and concelebrants were welcomed by a traditional Tribal dance by the Women. Mr. Richard John, one of the commission members read the Mass introduction. Brothers from St. Charles Seminary conducted the choir.

During the homily, Bishop started with the plights of migrants and that of the Holy Family- Jesus, Mary and Joseph. The story of Jesus and His parents fleeing from Bethlehem to Egypt. He gave the Pope's message on four-fold calls for each one of us: Welcome, Protect, Promote and Integrate the migrants to our parishes and society.



He stressed that each one of us have the responsibility to welcome the migrants coming from the villages, cities and other states. We are also called to protect the rights of migrants coming to our cities. They should be given freedom of religious practice, employment opportunities etc. All of us together need to integrate them in our society, including them in the Church, like choir, BEC, women's group, PPC etc. 26th December being the feast of St. Stephen Bishop stressed on the faith aspects of the migrant community. In every struggle and difficulty to have a deep faith in Jesus.



After the Eucharistic Celebration we had a small cultural programme. Mrs. Juliet Robert compered the programme. We welcomed the Bishop and all other guests with a bouquet of flowers.

The programme featured a diverse range of cultural performances, including traditional carol singing. Brothers from St Charles Seminary put up a skit on giving hope and care for the elderly. Through a series of well -crafted scenes and heartfelt portrayals, the skit aimed to raise awareness about the importance of fostering a culture of compassion and support for the aging persons. The skit left a lasting impression on the audience, eliciting a range of emotions from empathy to inspiration. Many participants expressed how the performance resonated with their own experiences and served as a reminder of the importance of maintaining hope in the face of adversity.



While addressing the gathering Bishop emphasized in getting their ID cards, like Aadhar and Election Cards and vote responsibly during the general election. He also highlighted the importance of Children's education and requested them to admit children in a good school which is run by Sisters and Fathers. He requested them to attend Mass and other para liturgical services conducted in their parishes. He concluded his address by Blessing the people for the bright future.

Fr. Anthony Xavior enlightened the people on the rights of migrant workers

Feedback from the participants wasoverwhelmingly positive. They expressed their gratitude for the opportunity to come together, share laughter and create lasting memories. They boned with each other and the community spirit among them and made more contacts.





This programme brought warmth, Joy and a sense of community feeling to all the participants, marking a delightful celebration of Christmas.

The success of the programme was amplified by the active participation of commission members.

Honorable guests Dr. Urmila Shirsagar and Rev. Fr. Balaraju Madanu addressed challenges faced by women farmers. And empowered women farmers shared their experiences and different farming methods with others.





AWARENESS ON LABOUR RIGHTS TO WOMEN UNORGANISED WORKER

On 18th February 2024 the Arch-Diocese of Nagpur, with the help of Christian Workers Movement and Migrants Commission organised a Labour rights awareness program. On this particular occasion 150 migrants from different parishes were present, Adv. Shriram Deobra guided the participants on how to seek legal aid, when their rights are violated

SAVE A FAMILY PLAN (SAFP)

Nagpur Multipurpose Social Service Society (NMSSS) works with the poor marginalized families under Save a Family Plan (SAFP) proving sustainable socio-economic development of women. SAFP has impoverished around 2000 families with monthly financial support. At present we have only 74 families who have been receiving support from this project. Under this program there are numbers of Success Stories of marginalised women who have enhanced their quality of life.





SCAND ST COMMISSION

'Rise of the least of the society' or working towards the upliftment of the most depressed of the society 'or 'the poorest sections of the society' currently we are working in the slum areas of the Ramabai Ambedkar, Jaitala. Due to utter poverty, lack of education this community often faces various problems in their day-to-day living. To uplift the poor we conducted various activities such as literacy programs for school dropouts, eco-friendly living, awareness on labour rights and linkages with government schemes. We visited people of all faith during the Christmas celebration, imparting value-based education to slum children & adults. These activities have helped them to overcome some of their problems





WOMEN'S COMMISSION

The primary goal of the Women's Commission is the "Empowerment of women through faith formation, capacity building, and issue-based network in the Archdioceses of Nagpur." In line with this goal, the Women's Commission of the Archdiocese of Nagpur organized a campaign and initiated a movement to advocate for rights and justice for the victims of violence in Manipur. इस बार हम छोटानागपुर के विश्वासी जो नागपुर में निवासरत हैं सोचा कि लूर्द माता महोत्सव में विभिन्न क्षेत्रीय भाषाओं में मिस्सा पूजा होता है तो क्यों ना हमारी मात्री भाषा कुंडुख भाषा को लूर्द माता महोत्सव में जगह दिया जाए। तत्पश्चात हम लोगों ने मीटिंग बुलाई और श्री सुशील कुजूर एवं श्री सुशील तिग्गा को रोजरी पल्ली के पल्ली पुरोहित फादर सुनील तिर्की ओ पी से संपर्क कर इस सिलसिले में चर्चा करने के लिए कहा गया। इसके तुरंत बाद हमने फादर सुनील तिर्की ओ पी से मिला और लूर्द माता महोत्सव में कुंडुख भाषा में मिस्सा चढ़ाने के लिए अन्य क्षेत्रीय भाषाओं की तरह जगह दिया जाए तो कैसा रहता?

फादर को यह बात अच्छा लगा और हमें आश्वासन दिया गया कि मैं और फादरों से सलाह लेकर आप लोगों को सूचित करता हूं।



जानकारी हेतु, कुंडुख भाषा क्या है ? भारत देश में लगभग ६४६ अनुसूचित जनजाति (आदिवासी)लोग हैं जिसमें उरहंव जनजाति के लोग भी हैं जो मुख्य रूप से छत्तीसगढ़ , उड़ीसा , झारखंड , बिहार , वेस्ट बंगाल ,आसाम, मध्यप्रदेश , महाराष्ट्र और पूरे भारत देश के कोने-कोने में बसे हुए हैं । ये द्रविड़यन समूह के लोग हैं इनकी बोली ही कुंडुख भाषा है जो मुख्यतः उपरोक्त राज्यों एवं अन्य जगहों पर मात्री भाषा (Mother Tung) के रूप में बोली जाती है।

हमें इंतजार करने के लिए ज्यादा सयम नहीं लगा कुछ ही दिन में फादर का फोन आया और मुस्कुराते हुए बताए कि कुंडुख भाषा में मिस्सा के लिए जगह मिल गई है यह सुनकर हमें अत्यंत हर्ष हुआ जिसका कोई सीमा नहीं रहा। फादर को इस बड़े कार्य के लिए दिल से धन्यवाद देते हैं।

इसके बाद छोटानागपुर समूह में, पड़ोसी राज्य जैसे म.प्र.से भोपाल , छत्तीसगढ़ से जशपुर, रायगढ़, कोरबा, बिलासपुर, रायपुर, भिलाई, राजनांदगांव, डोंगरगढ़ साथ ही साथ बैतूल, सिवनी, बालाघाट, गर्राटोला, अमरावती, नागेपल्ली, इटापल्ली, गढ़िचरौली आदि जगहों पर आग की तरह यह खबर फैला दिया गया जिससे कुंडुख भाषी मरियम भक्त इस मिस्सा में भाग ले सकें।

हमें यह कुंडुख भाषा मिस्सा यादगार बनाना था क्योंकि यह ाँशें वां लूर्द माता महोत्सव तथा हम छोटानागपुर वासियों को बयालीस साल के बाद पहल किया गया और उसमें मंजूरी मिली। इसलिए गाने एवं मिस्सा का जबाब के लिए अभ्यास शुरू किया गया। अभ्यास का सत्र कभी सेंट मार्टिन नगर, कभी वाड़ी, कभी गिट्टीखदान तो कभी आदरणीय फादर रेक्टर सेंट चार्ल्स सेमिनरी से अनुमित लेकर अहडीटोरियम में अभ्यास किया गया। इस सहयोग के लिए सेंट चार्ल्स सेमिनरी के फादर रेक्टर को संस्था की ओर से हार्दिक बधाई।

इस मिस्सा के मुख्य याजक श्रद्धेय फादर संजीव कुजूर बैतूल से, फादर फिलिप टोपनो अजनी से, फादर बेनेडिक्ट केरकेट्टा रेक्टर नोर्बाटाईन से, फादर अगुस्टीन तिर्की सेंट मार्टिन नगर से, फादर प्रफुल्ल एक्का और ब्रदर डीकन सेंट मार्टिन नगर से शामिल थे इनको भी तहे दिल से छोटानागपुर वासियों की ओर से बहुत बहुत बधाई एवं शुभकामनाएं देता हूं।

इस अभ्यास में सेंट चार्ल्स सेमिनरी के ब्रदरस,येरला के सेंट जोसेफ सिस्टरस, जियो दया की सिस्टर आप सबों को बहुत बहुत धन्यवाद और आगे भी आप सबों यही उम्मीद की आशा करता हूं।

Christmas Joy Unleashed: A Festive Tale from Mary Queen of the Apostles Parish



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


ST. PETER'S CHURCH, BHANDARA

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FAITH & Evangelization

The very first pages of the Bible present us with the drama of original goodness, temptation and sin. The Tempter, in the form of a serpent, is subtle, instilling doubt about God's wisdom and intentions, and playing on our ambition and pride. Just as love is its own reward, so evil is its own punishment; only after sinning do we truly appreciate the wrong we have done. The Scriptures and the masters of the spiritual life urge us to recognize and reject evil at its root, to be alert to the wiles of the devil, and above all, to keep watch over our hearts, lest the first stirrings of sin threaten our closeness to the Lord and our obedience to his loving plan for our lives.



VICES AND VIRTUES

The spiritual striving:

The Christian life involves a constant struggle to resist sin and to grow in holiness. Jesus, himself sinless, submitted to baptism by John and was tempted in the desert, in order to teach us the need for spiritual rebirth, conversion of mind and heart, and unfailing trust in God's mercy and sustaining grace. May our reflections on the virtues and vices help us to imitate the Lord's example, to grow in wisdom and self-understanding, and to discern between good and evil. As we advance in the knowledge and practice of the virtues, may we come to experience the joy of closeness to God, the source of all good, authentic happiness and the fullness of eternal life.

Gluttony

As a guest at the wedding feast of Cana, Jesus taught the goodness of food and drink, and the joy of table fellowship. Rejecting the ritual distinction between pure and impure foods, the Lord turns our attention to our personal relationship with consumption of food. In societies troubled by eating disorders and which, all too often, waste great amounts of food even as many people in our world go hungry, our eating habits should be moderate and socially responsible. May the prayers we say in thanksgiving for God's gift of our daily bread, inspire us to be mindful of our responsibility towards others and virtuous in our enjoyment of the good things of this earth.

Lust

We now turn to lust, which is opposed to the beauty of that love which the Creator has implanted in our hearts and called us to cultivate in our relations with others, especially by the responsible use of our sexuality. Lust poisons the purity of love by turning it from a chaste, patient and generous acceptance of another person in all the mysterious richness of his or her being, into a egotistic desire for immediate and possession satisfaction. God's gift sexuality, which finds sublime expression in conjugal love, is at the service of human fulfilment and authentic freedom, whereas lust enchains us in selfishness and emptiness.

Avarice

An undue attachment to wealth, which hinders us from being generous with regard to others. Greed is not simply a selfish hoarding of money or material objects. but a distorted relationship with reality and even a form of enslavement. The Desert Fathers saw greed as an attempt to avoid facing the reality of death, which is opposed to Jesus' advice to accumulate treasures in heaven rather than earthly goods (cf. Mt 6:19-20). May our use of the world's goods always be marked by evangelical freedom, responsibility and a spirit of generous solidarity, in imitation of Christ himself, who, though he was rich, became poor for our sakes, so that by his poverty, we might become rich (cf. 2 Cor 8:9).

Wrath

The uncontrolled anger that may well begin with brooding over offenses received, but ends up being self-destructive damaging to our relationships with others, leading ultimately to violence and even war. Jesus teaches us to forgive those who sin against us, while Saint Paul urges us never to let the sun set on our anger. Yet there is an appropriate kind of anger, which consists in righteous indignation before evil and injustice. As with all the passions, so too with anger: it is up to us, with the sustaining grace of the Holy Spirit, to govern and direct our emotions in order to serve God's kingdom of reconciliation, justice and peace.


Sorrow

We now centre our attention on spiritual sadness. Saint Paul speaks of a "godly grief" and a "worldly grief" (2 Cor 7:10). The former prompts conversion, enabling us to cling to hope and, therefore, leads to joy. The latter stems from dashed hopes and disappointments, eroding the soul with discouragement sadness. Unlike most vices that seek fleeting pleasures, sadness indulges itself by wallowing in sorrow, hindering spiritual growth. As an antidote to this kind of despondency, the Desert Fathers recommended embracing Christ's resurrection; for the risen Jesus redeems all the happiness that has remained unfulfilled in our lives.

Acedia

Mow consider acedia or sloth, which, although associated in English with laziness, is above all a deep spiritual apathy, manifested by discontent and aversion to attentive prayer and growth in our relationship with God. According to the monastic tradition, this "noonday devil" is best overcome by the patience of faith. This includes accepting the poverty or dark night of faith, which then enables us, by God's grace, to sense the divine presence and to continue to reach out to God. The saints themselves show us that perseverance in time temptation leads us to set practical goals for our daily life and moves us to lean on Jesus, who always remains with us.

It is the true faith, the very human faith, which despite everything, despite the darkness that blinds it, still humbly believes. It is that faith that remains in the heart, like embers beneath the ashes. It always remains. And if one of us falls prey to these vice, or to the temptations, try to look within and fan the embers of faith; that is how we keep going.



We have to be the custodians of our hearts. And that is why we do not converse with the devil. This is the recommendation — guard the heart — that we find in various fathers, in the saints. And we must ask for this grace of learning to keep watch over the heart. Knowing how to guard our heart is a form of wisdom. May the Lord help us in this work. Those who keep watch over their heart, guard a treasure. Brothers and sisters, let us learn to guard the heart.


